- The first class I saw this morning was Ms Thomson's Year 2 class: I was lucky enough to see
 Ms Thomson say "ata marie" and sing to her class, and to see Mrs Vien teach some
 Mandarin too. The children all seemed to be having fun, and I have so much admiration for
 the teachers of our youngest students. I loved the singing especially.
- Then I dipped into Ms Waldeck's Year 7 Scratch lesson, which was great fun; I listened to
 Mrs Jones-Hill's wonderfully soothing voice read a brand new story called "Hey Grandude!"
 By Paul McCartney; and then I saw Mrs Roberts teach her Year 3 class a very wonderful
 lesson about reading.
- Thanks to the wonders of Microsoft Stream, I then learned a huge amount about Maslow and Herzberg in a senior Business Studies class from Mrs Hawthorn, before watching Mrs Perrin talk to her POD on the second day of the lockdown, giving them some great advice on how to handle themselves at this difficult time. I can see lots of variety and innovation going on (thank you to our teachers!), and I'm really pleased to see it in action. In the background, our leaders are supporting teachers, checking in and trying to make sure that we are being as consistent as we can be. Thank you to all those parents who have been in touch directly with teachers, whether to say thank you for their work, or to ask questions about the online programmes. We welcome these questions, so please keep asking them.

A couple of quick bits of news today:

- 1. Our e-books have been very successful so much so that we exceeded our limit in Primary already and so have upgraded our plan for both the Primary and College collections. We now have the largest plan we can, but there are still limits, so please make sure that children borrow only those books that they are going to read. We also have some age limits in place for suitable content: this is always a judgement call, and Mrs Coombridge, our Librarian, has carefully been checking each title to be as accurate as she can be.
